Rector's Letter

In last week's Bulletin I finished asking 'As we begin this new year, how will you be part of this Great Commission?' The goal of the Great Commission is that as followers of Jesus we make disciples, that is, other followers of Jesus. If we take a close look at the Great Commission we can see that there are three parts to the disciple making process - 'Going', 'Baptising' and 'Teaching'. If we take this observation and Paul's statement from 1Corinthians 12 that we are one body (remember the introduction to the passing of the peace?) with many parts, then we can safely assume that we will all have different parts to play in the fulfilment of the Great Commission.

Remember from Mark 1 that John the Baptist came proclaiming a baptism for the repentance of sin. The gospel writers tell us that people came from all around to hear John's preaching. John's ministry reached deeply into the wider community. His 'going' was into the desert regions along the banks of the Jordan.

In the gospel reading this morning from John 1:43-51 we see Jesus deciding to 'go' to Galilee. He finds Philip and gives him the command to 'Follow me.' Even Jesus follows the prescriptions of the Great Commission. Philip then 'goes' and finds Nathanael and tells him that they have found the one whom Moses and the prophets wrote about. Nathanael's a bit sceptical and states 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?'

What happens next ought to be a great encourager for those of us who are a little hesitant to share our faith. Philip doesn't give a full blown exposition of the gospel. He doesn't copy John the Baptist's approach and tell Nathanael he's a sinner who needs to repent. He merely says 'Come and see.'

It's when Nathanael is introduced to Jesus that his scepticism is assuaged. It's Jesus who does the convincing of Nathanael that he truly is the Son of God. Because we are part of a body and a body has different parts, the first step in obeying the Great Commission lies in knowing what our part is. John the Baptist knew his role was to prepare the way of the Lord. Philip was an inviter, he invited Nathanael to assess for himself the person of Jesus. Next week we'll see how Jesus called the other disciples in Mark 1:14-20 and in preparation for that you might like to read John 1:35-42 and reflect on what part you could play in making disciples of all nations.

Use the QR code for a Quick Response!

Although QR codes are not mandatory for church services (apart from funerals and weddings), any paper records of attendance at a church service DO need to be digitised within 4 hours under the new regulations. The Parish has a QR code which is designed to be used with the **Service NSW app**. If you haven't already, we recommend you download this app and install it on your smartphone. (Please set up a My Service NSW account if you don't have one.)

On arrival at church, open and log into the Service NSW app (it may be necessary to use your four-digit code, as set by you during installation) and under Tools select 'COVID Safe Check-in'. Your camera will be switched on by the app and you will be asked to point it at the QR code. Your contact details should automatically appear – confirm these, then press 'Check in'. (Please check out at the end of the service.)

Thank you for your assistance in doing this, and in helping others - our aim is to eventually have the sign-in sheet used only by those who do not use a smartphone, and perhaps by those that have an early model phone.
