1 st	Philip and James, Apostles & Martyrs: Jesus said to him, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him." <i>John 14:6-7</i>
2 nd	Fifth Sunday of Easter: Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us. <i>1 John 4:11-12</i>
3 rd	"Those who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me; and those who love me will be loved by my Father and I will love them and reveal myself to them." John 14:21

8 th	Julian of Norwich, holy woman and mystic (d.1417): For we are so preciously loved by God that we cannot even comprehend it. <i>Julian of Norwich</i>
9 th	Sixth Sunday of Easter: For the love of God is this, that we obey his commandments. And his commandments are not burdensome, for whatever is born of God conquers the world. And this is the victory that conquers the world, our faith. Who is it that conquers the world but the one who believes that Jesus is the Son of God? <i>1 John 5:3-5</i>
